DESCRIPTION

Patients with neurological and neurosurgical disorders, such as brain tumors, aneurysms, infections, inflammations, multiple sclerosis, myasthenia gravis, and stroke may present with visual disturbances. If the correct diagnosis is made, sight can often be saved or double vision eliminated; if not, bilateral blindness, permanent diplopia, or even death may result. This one-day course will use a case-based approach presented by expert faculty to focus on the diagnosis and management of patients with a variety of such "neuro-ophthalmologic" disorders. Special emphasis will be placed on presenting symptoms and signs as well as appropriate ancillary tests that can lead the clinician, whether ophthalmologist, optometrist, neurologist, neurosurgeon, or internist, to the correct diagnosis and, from there, to the appropriate treatment in a timely fashion. Ample time will be reserved for questions and comments from the audience.
