#### **DESCRIPTION**

### WHO SHOULD ATTEND

This activity is intended for academic researchers.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

After attending this activity, the learner will demonstrate the ability to:

- Using specific examples, name two strategies used in your day-to-day teaching to provide effective feedback and coaching to learners.
- Using active learning strategies, describe a specific plan utilized in small and large group teaching settings.
- Identify one personal source of bias that prevented you from writing a thorough and balanced learner evaluation.
- Identify two barriers when providing remediation feedback to learners, and what you did to overcome them.
- Name a barrier to incorporating active learning strategies into common teaching settings that you were not able to address, and use a specific example to explain what prevented you from overcoming/addressing the barrier.
- Using specific examples, list any barriers to creating an inclusive learning environment in the online learning space and what you did to overcome them.
- Did you encounter any barriers, when employing one of the techniques learned in the workshop in your day-to-day teaching? If so, use a specific example to explain what you did to overcome the barrier.
